MHJA Member of the Year Award:

Last summer the issue of poor sportsmanship came up several times. In response to that, the board is introducing a new sportsmanship award. The award is the MHJA Member of the Year. It will be awarded to one junior and one adult member. We decided the answer isn't to police and punish bad behavior but to highlight the behavior we want to emulate MHJA. If we teach and learn by example we can create and maintain a healthy competitive spirit among our members. To nominate someone for the award, a member will send or email, to a board member, a written explanation of why they think that individual qualifies for the award. A member can nominate more than one member for the award. Nominations can take place at anytime during the show season until the announced deadline. Nominees and those placing the nominations must be MHJA members.

The goal is to recognize outstanding members who exemplify good horsemanship, sportsmanship and integrity. Consider nominating someone who is a good role model for you, your children and/or your students; Someone who makes a difference to MHJA and it's members; Someone who shows a good competitive spirit by being a good winner and a good loser; Someone who is consistently ready to help others and give their support; Someone who exemplifies impressive and conscientious treatment of their horses; Someone you think represents MHJA in an outstanding manner; Someone you respect, look up to or aspire to be like.

Eventually we can expand this award to the USHJA Affiliate Sportsmanship Awards program. We can submit our winners for regional and national awards. So, be on the lookout this show season for behavior befitting to this distinguished award.

Earn National Awards at MHJA Shows

For 2011, the United States Hunter Jumper Association (USHJA) has some WONDERFUL new opportunities for Junior riders and Adult Amateurs. To qualify for these special awards, you need only join the USHJA as an Outreach member, (if you are not a regular member) for \$15.00 and ride in the same classes you normally do!!! The requirements are two over-fences classes, consisting of one "regular" class and one "handy" class. Qualifying classes are the 2'3" Hunter (Bronze), 2'6" Hunter (Silver), 3' Hunter (Gold), and the 3'3" Hunter (Platinum). These classes will be run as a "class-within-a-class", so no divisions will be added to the shows. However, ONLY USHJA members will accumulate points for these national awards. There are also additional awards and opportunities for Juniors, including an invitation to the Capital Challenge Horse Show held in Washington DC. Christy, Jackie and Jack Wich, adopted and rescued two miniature donkeys, **Piper and Russell**, from a horrible life at the notorious **Niarada** animal sanctuary that was in the news the past few months. The duo have been at the **Wich's** Frenchtown farm for over a month, and are now just feeling happy and safe enough to let loose their full-size songs, or brays. The farm's three horses--- **MT**, a rescued quarter horse, and **Parker and Max**, two well-bred thoroughbreds-- have finally gotten used to the loud little souls in their lives, according to **Christy**. Despite the donkey's past of severe neglect and abuse, they are blossoming into loving, cheerful members of the **Wich** family. The **Wichs** feel so strongly about giving a helping hand to four-leggeds in need, they pick one item in their Missoula bakery, the **Black Cat**, and donate 40 percent of the profits they make on that product each month to **Animeals**, a non-profit that rescues and feeds suffering animals. If you need any other reason for eating a delicious pastry, swing by the bakery on W. Broadway and indulge for a good cause.

Gayl Russell and Artic Moon, the 17-year-old barely broke gelding she saved from the sales ring last March, were featured in a photo in the Feb. 7 edition of Chronicle of the Horse. The duo earned championship ribbons across Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana during the 2010 season.

Ashley Wren's jumper, **Popular Nightmare**, went in his first Grand Prix in November at the Show for Champions in Denver and placed 6th in a tough course and against tough competition. Ashley has also added several Grand Prix potentials to her herd. The four Holsteiners (a stallion, mare, and two geldings) are from the Cudmore's Heartland Farm. The stallion, who goes by the name Cheetah, is out of the famed Conejo. Ashley hopes to compete the big boy on the Grand Prix Circuit by end of summer. Popular Nightmare is taking a break from showing to recover from some hoof issues. If all goes according to plan, the familiar pair on the MHJA circuit will be back in the ring for April competition in Washington or Colorado.

Broussard died in December and the award was accepted by her daughter **Sarah Kelly** and her husband **Jerome Broussard**.

Equestrians around the World Mourn the Passing of Becky Broussard

WHITEFISH, MONT. (December 27, 2010) - Rebecca Broussard, a visionary in the world of Equestrian Eventing, died on Dec. 24 after a brave battle with cancer. Friends and family gathered on Christmas to honor her life, while public celebrations of her legacy will be planned at equestrian competitions this summer.

Born in Jeanerette, Louisiana on February 17, 1942, she is survived by her husband Jerome, daughters Rebecca and Sarah, grandchildren Lorraine and Raymond Nicholson, Tommye and Alexander Kelly, brothers Barry Shaw and John Chaney, sisters Rosemary Thomas and Mildred Shaw, uncle Pat Neff, nieces Jamie Horton, Marcus Shaw, Sam, Emma and Grace Thomas.

Becky was often touted as one of the strongest supporters of Equestrian Eventing in the United States. She was the founder of The Event at Rebecca Farm, an equestrian triathlon and World Cup qualifier held annually in Kalispell that will celebrate its 10th anniversary this summer.

“She is, hands down, the most important person in Eventing in the Western United States and arguably the most important person in Eventing in the entire nation,” said U.S. Eventing Association (USEA) President Kevin Baumgardner, in a *Chronicle of the Horse* article this past summer.

Becky had long talked about her love of helping riders in the West compete on the world stage and her vision included the historic possibilities of bringing riders from Europe to Montana in the future. This past summer she helped organize an historic flight of 18 horses from the East Coast, including many Olympians, who competed at her namesake Event.

“My mom touched the Eventing careers of so many riders,” said her daughter, Sarah Broussard-Kelly. “She will truly be missed, but she has left behind a legacy that will live on forever. Not only at The Event at Rebecca Farm, but through all of the lives that she has touched that will keep her and her memory alive.” Mrs. Broussard got her nursing degree in the late 1970s

from the University of Evansville in Evansville, Ind. and worked as a nurse in Henderson, Ky. until she moved to Anchorage, Ky. She worked with Hospice when she lived in Mandeville, Jamaica. She was a board member of the U.S. Equestrian Team, a Trustee on the Endowment Foundation of the USEA, as well as a member of the Board of Governors and Executive Committee for the USEA.

Becky was also a member of PEO, an international association that supports education for women, and involved in the Flathead Festival, Glacier Chorale & Symphony, Backcountry Horsemen, Human Therapy on Horseback, Whitefish Winter Classic, and the local Eventing association. She established a million dollar scholarship fund at Flathead Valley Community College, was a major supporter of the Kentucky Horse Park, served on the international committee for The World Equestrian Games, and supported dozens of local charities such as Shepherd’s Hand and the United Way.
